

TCAA HISTORY

On July 14, 1995 three retired Transportation Corps (TC) Army Aviators met in Williamsburg, Virginia to discuss the idea of getting together with locally retired TC aviators for some periodic “hangar flying” sessions. From this initial meeting sprung the Transportation Corps Aviation Association (TCAA).

The stated purpose of TCAA is to permit all those who served in TC aviation and aircraft maintenance units and in TC aviation assignments during their active Army service to share in preserving the history and accomplishments of TC aviation and aircraft maintenance units and their personnel, from the inception of the Transportation Corps in 1942 until the creation of the Army Aviation Branch in 1983 and the transfer of aircraft maintenance responsibility to the Aviation School in 1988. To this end the TCAA will hold such luncheon meetings, conferences, and reunions as may be desired by the membership.

TCAA has now grown to over 275 members located in 34 states and overseas. The monthly meetings are usually attended by approximately 35 to 40 members. We have begun inviting other transportation and aviation oriented organizations, most notably Quad-A and NDTA, to join us. Total flying time of all members exceeds 1,000,000 hours. There have been many reunions held during the annual Transportation Corps Regimental week in July. TCAA holds annual golf tournaments and has special luncheons with our spouses.

The TCAA logo is a set of Army aviator wings with the Transportation Corps branch winged wheel on top of the wings, with TCAA inscribed above the TC wheel.

The TCAA motto is: “Still....Above the Best.”
